Why We Need Family

- <u>Child Brain Development</u>: The Serve and Return Relationship
- <u>Serve and Return Example</u>
- Family Care vs. Institutional or Temporary Care
 - 1. One or two caretakers provides strong, trusting relationships
 - 2. Caretakers responsible for many children do not have time to give the necessary amount of individualized attention
 - 3. When a child's caretaker changes the trust relationship needed to develop through serve and return must be recreated
- <u>Child Welfare Spectrum</u>: Finding the best, permanent solution for children

While this chart may not be perfect and each child's individual needs must be considered, I believe that generally, the child should be placed as near to the top of this

- 1. Biological Parents
- 2. Biological relative or closely connected individual
- 3. Domestic Adoption (as close to the child's original community and culture as possible)
- 4. Intercountry Adoption
- 5. Temporary, Changing Foster Care
- 6. Institutionalization

Building a Culture of Adoption

- Public Education & Awareness
 - Goal: Adoption: A normal, acceptable answer for children living outside family
 - Tell true stories
 - Use accurate, neutral language
- Systems and Laws
 - **Legal possibility**: If a child cannot be raised by their biological parents it is right to create a way to make it legally possible for them to be completely part of another family.
 - Laws should be child-focused

- Laws should be clear, but flexible to allow the unique needs of each individual child to be met.
- **Equal rights**: Adopted children should have the same opportunities as children in biological families
- **Financial and Service Support**: Tax credits, support of medical and legal costs, providing special services for children and families who need special support
